1. To give importance to value education, a paper on ethics and culture has been introduced.
2. Extra Credit courses are introduced which would help the advanced learners and those who are interested in acquiring knowledge about the areas, which hitherto unknown to them, to remain a step ahead of others when it comes to getting an employment.
3. As atleast a few papers should be socially relevant, papers on subjects relating to the avocation, the people of neighbouring community are pursuing, are introduced.
4. To prepare the students to appear for competitive examinations and to face the placement interviews ,papers on communication skills and mathematical aptitude are introduced.
5. The curriculum content of the language papers have been thoroughly revised to make the students speak and write fluently in those languages.
6. As we find most of the students, especially women students, are malnourished or under nourished, it was thought that it would be better to make them aware about how to maintain their health, a paper on food science and Nutrition is introduced.
7. The subjects which are important but not included in the curriculum by the Bharathiar University are introduced in consultation with the experts from the industry. Thus the following subjects are proposed to be introduced

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

1. Whenever a new product is introduced into the market, the students are asked to study in detail about such a product and make a detailed presentation in the presence of other students which enables the students not only to enhance their knowledge but also to develop their confidence in facing the audience without fear or hesitation.
2. To encourage the students, who are classified as fast learners, extra credit course are introduced so that they acquire additional knowledge and a student can opt to choose any two subjects in a semester starting from third semester.
3. Since majority of the students joining the institution are from agricultural families, a subject on floriculture is introduced so that it would be helpful for them to take up cultivation of ornamental flowers and earn adequate income for the family.
4. As it is found that most of the students, particularly girls students are under – nourished, a subject on food science and nutrition is included in the curriculum so that they would have an idea on how to maintain their health with the available vegetables and fruits without spending anything on the readymade nutrition supplements.
5. As most of the students are from rural background who had their education in the schools in vernacular language, they lack knowledge in English and are also poor in mathematical skills. Hence, subjects for improving their communication skills in English and mathematical aptitude are included in the curriculum and offered during all the semesters so that they become industry ready and ready to face the interviews.
6. Students are introduced to e-learning through Massive Open Source Online Courses (MOOC) and other sources like SWAYAM, FUTURE LEARN etc and they are free to choose any course from the open source as extra credit programme.
7. Online test is made compulsory for the students so that they would not fumble when appearing for such tests conducted by the companies visiting the campus for recruiting the students.

2.12 How does IQAC Contribute/Monitor/Evaluate the Teaching & Learning processes:

1. Before the commencement of any academic year, during summer vacation IQAC Meeting is conducted in which an elaborate plan is chalked out to carry out the various activities which helps in enhancing further the quality of education offered in the institution. While deciding on the various activities care is taken to see that the activities planned would improve the knowledge of the students in the areas of their study make them industry ready through various skill development programmes and to make them confident of facing the personal interviews through development of their attitude.
2. In the beginning of the year, IQAC meets and discusses with the members and Head of the Departments about the inclusion of new topics / new subjects / new papers in the syllabus and accordingly it decides on the FDP programmes to be conducted in order to enable the teachers not to have any difficulty in handling such topics or papers.
3. The IQAC members evaluate the performance of newly appointed staff members periodically, weaknesses if found are informed to them for improvement.

4. Every year academic audit is conducted to ensure that the academic programmes are carried out as planned. It also helps us to know the areas of weakness and hence it is possible to plan the steps to be taken for improvement.
5. Class Committee meetings are conducted twice a year in order to assess the performance of the teachers in the class, learning difficulties if any, lack of facilities available, adequacy of the books available in the library and any other difficulties faced by the students and to take suitable steps to redress them.
6. After the first continual internal assessment test the effectiveness of teaching learning process is assessed in the form of feedback from the students.

4. The members of each department are also encouraged to prepare as many monographs as possible in a year and circulate them among the members of the institution and other institutions for comments for improvement.
5. IQAC also recommends to the Management for additional increments and cash award for those who have successfully completed Ph.D programme.
6. For the development of Research activities IQAC encouraged the members of Faculty to apply for Major and Minor Research projects to UGC and accordingly 8 proposals were submitted to UGC.
7. Those who completed Ph.D programme successfully are given a cash award of Rs 5000/- in addition to a few increments in salary and promotion.

3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

1. The faculty of the department of English visited the Government High School at Narasipuram and conducted a day long program on 16.11.2016 giving training in developing the skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing in English to the students studying tenth standard.

3. In case the progress is not satisfactory the student is given counselling and constant encouragement to improve himself or herself.

Also based on a student's capacity and the requirements of skills to be possessed by the students as expected by the companies, the students are properly guided whether to attend the interview of one company or the other.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision:

Kovai Kalaimagal College of Arts and Science shall inspire and guide students to acquire knowledge, develop skill and a positive attitude that will enhance their personality, providing self- confidence to face the competitive world.

Mission:

1. To strive for excellence in academics.
2. To inculcate a positive attitude and to develop skill in students, to meet the challenges of the competitive world.
3. To develop self-confidence through adequate inter-action and relevant exposure.
4. To promote ethical and social values in the students.
5. To identify and encourage talents in academics and sports by rewarding them with scholarships.

6.2 Does the Institution has a Management Information System

YES. Every month, monthly report about the activities of the college is submitted to the management. In addition, copies of the minutes of the department, college council, and class committee meetings are submitted to the management for perusal and suggestions.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

For developing the curriculum, first the structure has been decided after extensive deliberations with the faculty and a few experts. Thus the structure has been decided as consisting of part I English , part II languages - Tamil/ French/Hindi/ Malayalam ,part III - Core , Allied and Elective papers and part IV – Skill Based Subjects ,Value Based education and Non Major Elective.

Then the syllabus content for each paper has been prepared in consultation with the peers and other experts. The meaningful and valid suggestions were incorporated. The papers offered under English language were thoroughly revised so that it would help improving the communication and writing skills of the students. Therefore the paper was named as Functional English instead of simply English.

The Board of Studies has been constituted with experts in the concerned subjects, industrial experts and the student representatives as members. The draft syllabus of each individual paper has been placed before the members of the Board of Studies for discussion and their suggestions, after which the syllabus is finalised.

In order to make the students employable it was felt that the training for developing communication skills in English and mathematical skills, papers on communication skills in English and aptitude have been included in the curriculum itself to be offered during all the semesters.

Since the syllabus should be socially relevant and be useful to the community nearby, 2 subjects namely floriculture and Food Science and Nutrition have been included, so that it would be helpful for the students to take up the cultivation of ornamental flowers incase they are interested in agriculture and to maintain good health at a minimum cost.

As it has been insisted in various Education Commissions that value education should form part of the curriculum 2 papers namely Ethics and Culture and Environmental Studies have been included.

Since the students are classified as slow and fast learners after the first Continues Internal Assessment test, it is felt that the fast learners should be encouraged to acquire additional Knowledge and hence extra credit courses for each individual discipline have been introduced.

As value addition, Certificate Courses are also offered depending on the demand from students and the importance of offering such Courses.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

1. For the new faculty recruited every year, a Faculty Development programme is organized at the beginning of the year on Teaching Methodologies using modern gadgets effectively, e- learning sources available, qualities to be possessed by a good teacher, and how to be effective in the classroom etc., Which enables the new faculty to take efforts to get adapted to the new environment.

2. After a period of about 15 days of their appointment, new faculty evaluation is done while the teacher is in the class. The weaknesses are noted and the concerned teachers are counselled and advised to improve himself/herself so that it would not be repeated in future.
3. Feedback is obtained from the students during every semester immediately after first Continuous Internal Assessment test to know about the performance of the teacher in the class on the basis of ten different criteria. In case any deficiency is pointed out by the students with regard to any of the criteria about a teacher, then such a teacher is informed about the same and is also guided as to how to improve himself/herself.
4. As for as the development of curriculum is concerned, the experts in the respective subjects, industrial experts, teachers and students are consulted and the curriculum is designed so as to include the subjects which relevant to the present day context and the knowledge of which is very much in demand by the industries. Also since the curriculum should be socially relevant, a few papers on agriculture based subjects are introduced. As it is the responsibility of the institution to make the students employable, papers dealing with subjects which would enhance the specific skills are introduced.
5. To make the students to have practical exposure, they are taken for industrial visit in order to see directly and learn the application of concepts which they have studied.
6. To have hands on training on certain subjects, workshops are also conducted.
7. To make the students abreast of the latest developments in the areas of their study , various seminars and conferences are organized.
8. To instill research bent of mind among the students, they are encouraged to present articles in seminars and conferences by providing financial support by the management.
9. The students are classified as slow learners and fast learners based on their marks scored in first Continuous Internal Assessment Test. Additional coaching is arranged for the slow learners and the fast learners are encouraged to opt for extra credit courses so as to acquire additional knowledge and to be a step ahead of others when it comes to appearing for personal interview.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The students' performance is evaluated through Continuous Internal Assessment tests, the components of which and the breakup of the marks allotted are as follows,

1. Internal Assessment Test for which the question paper is set as per the pattern of the question paper issued for End Assessment Examinations for 50 marks, online test covering 80% of the syllabus for which 100 multiple choice questions are given and assessed for 100 marks, two assignments of which one assignment is net based and assessed for 50 marks each and one model examination at the end of the semester covering the entire syllabus and assessed for 100 marks. Finally, these marks are reduced to 25 as given below

2. As far as the End Assessment Examinations are concerned, mostly the system that is followed by the parent university is followed except that for a few skill based subjects newly introduced, only internal assessment is done and there is no external examination.

3. For all the PG courses double valuation, one by the internal examiner and the other by the external examiner, is followed though the parent university follows single value system. This would prevent the students being affected unnecessarily due to wrong valuation by one examiner.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The faculty members who do not possess M.Phil degree are compelled to register for M.Phil programme as early as possible and similarly those who have not acquired Ph.D qualification are also instructed to register for the same under a suitable guide.

The faculty members who have completed M.Phil degree are encouraged to apply for Minor Research Projects and those who have acquired Ph.D are encouraged to apply for Major Research Projects. So far, four Major Research Projects and two Minor Research Projects have been sanctioned and the work completed.

The management encourages the faculty to present papers in seminars and conferences by meeting their registration and transportation costs. The faculty publishing an article in a reputed journal is also given a cash award of Rs.1000/-. The faculty completing Ph.D programme successfully is given a cash award of Rs.5000/- in addition to an additional increment in his salary and promotion to a higher cadre.

The teachers are also instructed to prepare as many monographs as possible as a prelude to publication of articles in the journals which would be circulated among the peers and experts for their suggestions for corrections, if any, and improvement.

The research committee meets periodically, assesses the research activities and advises the members suitably.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

As and when the syllabus is modified or restructured, the books required would immediately be purchased and added to the stock. Further, when new publications of books on the specific subjects are available in the market and rated as good by experts, such books are also added to the stock.

On the basis of the research activities by the research scholars new journals and magazines are subscribed depending on the needs.

The Library is fully computerised and it is also a member of DELNET , INFLIBNET and IEEE which enables access to a large number of e- journals

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

At the end of each academic year, the workload for various departments is calculated and the faculty requirement is assessed for each department. The vacancies, if any, are filled up by selecting suitable persons through personal interview by a committee. Similarly the vacancies arising among the administrative staff are also filled up as and when required.

In the beginning of the academic year, a list of resource persons who have specialised in different areas is prepared by each department and finalized after getting approval from the management. According to the programmes planned for the academic year, their services are utilized either for giving guest lecturers or for being resource persons in the seminars or workshops organized by the college.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

After assessing the number of vacancies likely to be created, an advertisement is released through dailies calling for applications from suitable candidates. The applications are scrutinized and the candidates fulfilling the eligibility conditions are called for an interview. The candidates are interviewed by an interview committee consisting of the Management Representative, Principal, Dean, Head of the Department, a senior professor and the subject experts. The candidates selected based on merit are appointed. The same procedure is also followed for appointing administrative staff.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The college has entered into MoU with the companies/Institutions like Sutherland Global Services Private Limited, Infosys BPO Limited, Monster, UTL Technologies Limited, Electronics Sector Skills Council of India (ESSCI), The World Community Service Centre (WCSC), STAR Associates, COINDIA, ICT Academy of TamilNadu for getting the students trained and for the companies to make use of the expertise available in the institution.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

Immediately after the results of the +2 examinations or the undergraduate examinations are published, applications are invited for UG and PG programmes as the case may be from the students. After the applications are received till the last date, call letters are sent to the students in case the number of applications received is more than the number of seats available or the admission letters in case the number of applications is not more than the number of seats available. While the students come for admission, proper counselling is given for choosing the right course based on the group or branch he has already studied.

The major drawback in this system is that a considerable number of students do not take the second test seriously. But under the autonomous system it has been changed in such a way that the student has to necessarily study all the units of the syllabus as the internal assessment is done as follows,

Further, as many students fail only in the aptitude tests conducted by the companies visiting the campus for recruiting the students, online tests exactly on the pattern of question papers issued by the companies are introduced.

6.11 Activities and support from the Alumni Association

The Alumni association meets twice a year, in which the activities relating to the students support services, faculty development and infrastructure development are discussed and suggestions invited. The relevant suggestions are forwarded to the management for implementation. The Alumni who run businesses also help in recruiting our students for their companies and in recommending our students for placements to the other companies known to them.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

Parent teacher association meets once a year in which all the developmental activities done in the college are explained and their suggestions for improvement are invited.

6.13 Development programmes for support staff

Computer training is provided to all the support staff. They are encouraged to enhance their qualification joining distance education program. In case they become eligible for appointment to a higher cadre or to a teaching position they are either promoted or absorbed as a lecturer.

6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly

Already the campus is eco-friendly with thousands of trees and plants of different varieties. Further the use of plastics is completely banned inside the campus. Waste water is recycled and used for the plants and trees. Initiatives are taken to install solar system to meet a part of the power consumption. The class rooms are spacious with lot of ventilation and hence it has also minimized the power consumption.

7. Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

1. Majority of the students who join our institution are from nearby villages and they belong to families pursuing agricultural avocation. Further, they have all studied in Government Schools in Tamil Medium and hence their English language proficiency is very poor. To improve their communication skill in English, small story books, containing stories mostly known to the students, written in English are distributed to the students and they are asked to go through the books and tell the stories in the class after about 10 days. This improves their vocabulary and to some extent their fluency in speaking in English.
2. A number of online tests in English and Mathematical aptitude are conducted with a view to train them to write such tests when conducted by companies visiting the campus, with confidence and come out successful.
3. The domain specific knowledge which is required to be possessed by students as per the requirements of most of the industries is assessed and accordingly training programmes or certificate courses, as the case may be, are conducted.

7.2 Provide the Action Taken Report (ATR) based on the plan of action decided upon at the beginning of the year

As planned at the beginning of the year, the following programmes were conducted:

1. All the Departments have inaugurated the students association and actively conducted many programmes to improve the attitude, skill and knowledge of the students.
2. The Department of English conducted seminars on “Communication Skills”, Bridge Course on “Fundamentals of English Grammar”, Training Programme on “Verbal Aptitude”, Self Development programme on “The Power of Positive Thinking”, extension activity on “Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing Skills” for the students of the Government high school, Narasipuram and literary competitions such as “Literary Fiesta 2016-2017” for the students of the college.
3. The Department of Tamil conducted many competitions like drawing, composition writing, oratorical, singing, etc., for the students of the college and the prizes were distributed. It has also conducted a seminar on “Culture of Individual Human Beings in Tamil Literature”, and extension activity for the students of Government High School , Narasipuram in which various competitions were conducted for the students and prizes were distributed.
4. The Department of Mathematics with CA conducted Bridge Course in Mathematics for all the first year Non-Mathematics students UG, Aptitude Training Classes, Personality Development Programme, for developing Communication Skills, Mathematical Quiz Competition, Seminar on “ Real Life Applications of Mathematics in Science and Technology”, National Programme for Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) classes, Massive Open Online Course (MOOC) classes conducted for the students of B.Sc., Mathematics (CA) . “Arts and Science Exhibition’ is organized on National Mathematics Day Celebrations and workshop on “Computer Graphics using c++”.
5. The Department of Computer Science conducted guest lectures on “Android Application in Linux”, “Ethical Hacking” and “Internet of Things”, skill based training programme on “Terracotta Jewellery Designing”, personality development programme on “Personality Grooming” and celebrated “Pongal Festival” with school students. Students provided food with physical and psychological support to the blind people “Servicing to Blind School” in the village Uliampalayam, Coimbatore.
6. The Department of Computer Applications conducted a guest lecture on “Preparation for Placement”, “Technical Communication” and “Current Trend & Technologies”.
7. The Department of Information Technology conducted guest lectures on “Internet of Things”, “Project Development Methods” , “Android Operating System”, “Current Trends in Computing Technologies”, “Computing Technologies and Applications.”, Value based programme on “A Life on Happiness & Fulfilment”, “Measuring Success in Health Care”, workshop on “GIMP” and an extension activity on “Training program on

“C++ and Star office Packages” at Government Higher Secondary School, Madvarayapuram.

8. The Department of Commerce and Commerce (PA) conducted guest lectures on “Awareness on Capital Market”, “Corporate Etiquettes”, “GST Compliances & Non-Compliances”, “The impact of demonetization in Indian Economy” and conducted an exhibition and Extension Activities on “Hands on Training in Quelling” at Government Higher Secondary School, Sennanur and “Banking Operations” at Government Higher Secondary School, Sundakkamuthur.
9. The Department of Commerce with CA (UG) conducted a guest lectures on “Role of Commerce in Inclusive Growth”, “Current Trends in Audit Industry”, “Mutual Fund”, workshops on “Web Page Development”, “Commodity Trading” and “Tally.ERP9 Applications”, soft skill development programme on “Techniques for Career Mapping, and Taking Control of Psychological Barriers” and conducted an Exhibition “FASNACH – 2017”.
10. The Department of Business Administration with Computer Applications conducted guest lectures on “Job Opportunities in Banking Sector”, “Management – A Global Perspective”, “Demonetization”, workshops on “Software Testing”, “Web Designing”, Training Program on “Out Bound Training” and extension activity on “Banking Procedures” for 12th students at Maruthamalai Devasdhanam Higher Secondary School, Coimbatore.
11. The Department of Commerce with Computer Applications (PG) conducted guest Lectures on “ The Impact of e- Commerce on Society- A Global Perspective”, “The Indian Accounting Standards ” and a workshop on “Tally” .
12. The Department of International Business (PG) conducted a guest lectures on “Job Opportunities in International Business”, “Borderless World”, One Day Orientation Programme towards “Higher Studies” and In-House Training Programme on “Team Building”, “Leadership and Group Dynamics” and an extension activity on “Banking Procedures” for 11th students, Government Higher Secondary School Muthipalayam.

7.3 Give two Best Practices of the institution

I.Title of the Practice

1. Feedback and Class Committee Meeting

Immediately after the first CIA test, feedback is obtained from the students about the performance of teachers in the class. In addition, class committee meetings are also conducted with the representatives of various classes to know the difficulties and the requirements of the students.

2. Goal and the Context

The goal is to know the difficulties experienced by the students academically or otherwise and to alleviate the same.

Since the students come from different backgrounds their capacity to grasp whatever is taught in the class will also differ. Further what is taught in the class by a few teachers may not be understood by the students. Also in the class committee meetings the students can express whether the facilities available in the campus and the books available in the library are adequate or not. This helps the Management to provide the facilities as required by the students.

3. The Practice

Immediately after the first continuous internal assessment test, feedback is taken from a random sample of 30% of students from each class. The feedback is obtained on the basis of 10 aspects namely, subject knowledge of the teacher, clarity in explanation, audibility in voice, legibility in writing on the board, coverage of the syllabus, provision of course material, offering additional information not confining to only syllabus content, punctuality of the teacher, impartial nature, efforts taken by teacher to motivate the students and assistance and counselling rendered by the teacher. These aspects are evaluated by 5 point scale and average score for each aspect and the overall average are calculated for every individual teacher. When the overall average is more than 4, such a teacher is considered to be a good teacher and if the score is between 3 and 4, he/she needs improvement. When the score is less than 3, such teachers are given counselling on the basis of scores obtained for individual aspects and instructed not to repeat the same performance in the subsequent semesters.

After the answer sheets of first internal test are evaluated and returned to the students, class committee meetings are conducted by the Principal. A class committee consists of two top scoring students, two medium scoring students and two students whose scores are poor. In the meeting only these students and the Principal will be present. The Principal obtains information from these students about the coverage of the syllabus, whether there is any difficulty in understanding a particular subject and if so, the reason, whether the method of teaching adopted by the teacher is good enough, whether they have adequate learning resources and whether there are any other problems or difficulties other than academic matter. After obtaining such information, the HoDs are instructed to plan for action so that grievances expressed by the students redressed are within a time limit.

4. Evidence of Success

Since we gather information from the students about their class room experience and difficulties encountered in the beginning of the semester, it becomes possible to counsel the teachers and guide them to improve in the areas wherever they have scored less in the feedback, there is a remarkable improvement in their performance during the subsequent semesters.

In the class committee meetings, since students interact with the Principal in the absence of HoD or any other Teacher of the Department, they feel free and express truly whatever difficulties or problems they experience academically and non academically, the Management is able to understand them and take immediate steps to redress whatever is their grievance.

In implementing the above process, no problem has ever been encountered.

As far as the Resources are considered, the Management never hesitates in meeting the expenses from their own funds. Infact the Management is very happy in seeing that the students are happy in that their grievances are immediately redressed.

II. Title of the Practice

1. Finishing School Programme for Pre-Final Year Students

Finishing School Programme of duration 3 to 4 weeks is conducted for the first and second year students during their summer vacation.

2. Goal and the Context

The goal of this programme is to make the students understand the various skills needed to be developed in them so that they become employable and get selected by the companies in campus interviews.

3. The Practice

In the Finishing School Programme, HR personnel from Multinational

certain areas of training the students are invited. This programme is not compulsory for all the students. Only those who voluntarily come forward to undergo this training foregoing the vacation are admitted. They are trained extensively to improve their communication in English, Interpersonal relationship, Mathematical Aptitude, preparing their resume, fine tuning their personality, effectively facing the interview and active participation in group discussion.

4. Evidence of Success

At the end of the period of Finishing School Programme, a remarkable transformation that has happened in the students is clearly seen. The students are able to break the barriers which prevented them from coming to the front and come on the stage, speak fluently in English facing the audience without fear or shyness or hesitation. Therefore it has resulted in majority of the students who participated in the programme are getting selected by the companies in the campus interviews.

5. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Though the students voluntarily come forward to undergo this training programme, after a few days some students do not attend the programme regularly on account of the fact that such students go for part -time jobs in the afternoon. Further we find it difficult to motivate a few students to actively participate since they are from very poor families and their confidence level is almost zero.

Resources required for conducting this programme are met from the own funds of the Management by meeting the expenses incurred towards providing the training material, meeting the expenses for travel, accommodation and honorarium of the trainers and resource persons and the other contingent expenses.

7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

- ❖ Environmental Studies is included in the curriculum as a separate paper with 2 credits. Hence the students are aware of the ways of protecting the environment.
- ❖ Guest Lectures are arranged on environmental degradation and the measures to be taken for preventing the same and the role played by the students in such an action.
- ❖ Awareness programmes are conducted by the students in the nearby villages on the factors responsible for environmental degradation, need for protecting the environment and growing more trees.
- ❖ The use of plastics is banned in the institution.
- ❖ Waste water is recycled and used for trees and plants.
- ❖ Eco Club is functioning effectively in the campus in which students actively participate in planting saplings in and around the college, in periodically cleaning the nearby Siruvani Hills and in creating an awareness about the evils of using polythene bags.

- iii. Conducive environment suitable for the students' academic pursuit.
- iv. Reputation of the institution which attracts many companies to visit the campus for recruiting the students.
- v. Green Campus free from pollution

The weaknesses of the institution are

- i The students coming from poor family background who have studied in Tamil Medium in Government Schools.
- ii Distance of the institution from the city.
- iii Students lacking motivation and self confidence.

The opportunities are

- i A number of companies willing to visit the campus for campus recruitment on account of a number of training programmes conducted for the students but could not be accommodated because the period of their visit coincides with the period of examination.
- ii The possibilities of restructuring the curriculum so as to give more thrust on practical applications and also to make better use of courses available in open sources like, SWAYAM, MOOC, etc...

The major threat is that though a large number of women students are getting selected in campus interviews, majority of them are not permitted to join jobs as they are from rural background and their parents want to get them married as soon as they complete their studies.

8. PLAN OF INSTITUTION FOR NEXT YEAR

1. To introduce some socially relevant programmes.
2. To encourage the faculty to concentrate more on publication of research articles in reputed journals.
3. To prepare the members of faculty for applying to UGC for more number of major and minor projects.
4. To encourage all the departments to conduct National and International level seminars/ Conferences.

Annexure B

Analysis of the Feedback from Stake holders

Regarding the curriculum aspects, a few alumni have suggested that the contents of some papers should be revised so as to include the latest developments and accordingly the contents of such papers have been suitably revised in consultation with the experts in the meeting of the board of studies in the respective subjects.

Similarly a few students who are the representatives of different classes suggested that the subjects which have become obsolete and no more useful have to be removed and the subjects which are presently used extensively by the industries have to be included and their suggestions were accepted and incorporated in the syllabus after the approval of board of studies.

As for as teaching, learning and evaluation are concerned, a few alumni are of opinion that the teaching and learning should be more of interactive in nature than one way delivery of lectures. Group learning may be introduced for better understanding of the subjects. They also opined that ICT should be more effectively used.

From the feedback given by the students, it has been noticed that they want more number of state/national level seminars to be conducted in the college so that they will have an opportunity to not only attend such seminars and conferences for enhancing their knowledge but also to present research articles in seminars/conferences. Accordingly, state and national level seminars were organised by the individual departments.

As per the suggestions made by the students regarding the method of teaching and learning, e-learning has been introduced to the students by effectively using the resources available from MOOC, EDX, UDEMY, UDACITY, NPTEL, FUTURE LEARN, SOS TOOLS etc.,.

Students and alumni have expressed their satisfaction about the way in which they were all motivated in presenting articles in seminars and conferences. Some of the students who have passed out their PG courses have expressed that it was only the motivation by the staff which has made them to continue their research by joining M.Phil and Ph.D programmes. Regarding extension activities a few alumni are of opinion that more number of activities should be conducted for the benefit of the economically weaker section in the nearby villages.

Regarding infrastructure and learning resources both the students and alumni have expressed their satisfaction.

As far as student support services are concerned both the students and alumni have expressed their fullest satisfaction and they were all in praise of the efforts taken by the Management in making the students employable and getting them placement in reputed companies.
